Polson Museum Receives \$4,000 Grant from the Washington Commission for the Humanities: *Vanishing Logger* Exhibit Planned

This October, the Polson was awarded \$4,000 from the Washington Commission for the Humanities to develop a traveling exhibit entitled *The Vanishing Logger*. The grant was written by sisters Cheryle and Char Easter, of Amboy, Wash., who are working with the Polson to create this photo-journalistic exhibit documenting the logger in the 21st century.

Providing an historical perspective, the exhibit will record where loggers stand after a century of attitudes and landscapes in flux. Told in the loggers' image, it is a testimonial to an historical profession in transition.

The *Vanishing Logger* will debut at the Polson next year before being moved throughout the Northwest. We'll be sure to keep you informed of the progress in developing this exhibit.

New Collections Storage Shelving Installed

Thanks to the Aberdeen Library, the Polson now has a fully shelved attic storage area. This September, upon its move back to their remodelled building, the library offered the bulk of its surplus shelving to area non-profits — among them the Aberdeen Museum, Hoquiam Friends of the Library, Grays Harbor Historical Seaport, Grays Harbor Genealogical Society, and the Polson Museum.

An especially big thanks goes to Museum volunteer Scott Lucas for his extensive help in dismantling, moving, and installing the shelves.

The bulk of this shelving now occupies two rows down the middle of the Museum attic. The steel shelves are in excellent condition, stand nearly seven feet tall, and are fully adjustable.

The addition of this shelving dramatically improves our ability to store and preserve our artifact collection. It will also allow us to better link our new computer collections database with a physical location for each artifact.

Collections Storage Extends Beyond the Museum's Walls

Thanks to the City of Hoquiam, the Polson Museum is now able to store some of its large equipment artifacts indoors. The blue building behind City Hall on 9th Street (formerly a beer distributorship), is now the home of our Ross lumber carrier and the soon-to-be home of our new Hyster lumber carrier and Dolbeer donkey engine.

U.S.S. Hoquiam Reunion

This September, the Polson welcomed four crewmen who served on the U.S.S. Hoquiam during World War II and the Korean War.

During their visit, we learned a few interesting facts. The U.S.S. Hoquiam — designated PF-5 (Patrol Frigate) — was the first ship in the U.S. Navy to be integrated.

During WW II, enroute to Alaska, the ship nearly made a stop at Hoquiam. Unfortunately, there were no bar pilots available at the time they passed by



the mouth of Grays Harbor. According to crewman James DeLeo, who told us the story, his quite shipmates were disappointed that they couldn't visit as they were all convinced that every bar in town would willingly serve them unlimited free drinks. While they missed their chance at becoming Hoquiam's home-town royalty during the war, many of the men who served aboard the ship have since visited Hoquiam to see what they missed.

Posey Mfg. Co.'s Hyster Lumber Carrier Added to Polson Collection

1948 Hyster Straddle Carrier



We're very excited to announce the addition of Posey Manufacturing's Hyster "No. 2" straddle carrier to the Polson's collection. Thanks to Bill and Doug Watson, who purchased the carrier at Posey's May 1998 auction and generously donated it to the Museum this fall, the Hyster will be preserved for the education of future generations.

Although the carrier needs some aesthetic improvements, it is in full working order. On November 4, Museum Board member Norm Callaghan and Director John Larson fired up the International "Green Diamond" 6-cylinder engine and drove the machine to town. If you'd like to see the carrier, it's currently parked at Norm's shop, Gordon's

Service, on the corner of 7th & K Streets in Hoquiam.

Thanks to the City of Hoquiam, we'll be able to store the Hyster, along with our Ross, at their 9th Street facility, enabling us to focus on the machines' conservation and restoration.
