Gile Mead to be Honored as Pioneer of the Year

Gile Mead, a Grays Harbor resident of 83 years, will be honored as the Polson Museum's 2000 Pioneer of the Year at a celebration at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, April 22, at the Machine Shop of Lamb Grays Harbor.

Mr. Mead, born December 11, 1905, in South Dakota, moved with his family as an infant to Grass Range, Montana where spent his boyhood years. At age 13, Gile moved with his family to Hoquiam where his father took a job with the Hoquiam Water Company.

In 1928, Gile began a life-long career with Lamb Grays Harbor as an "apprentice boy" in the machine shop. Through the 1930s, Gile worked on the varous projects then in production, including the development of the Lamb SpeedTrak log hauling machine. During the Second World War, Gile was in charge of all War production at Lambs supervising an extensive workforce busy producing hand grenade casings, anti-personnel mines, self-arming fuses, and propeller shafts.

Following the war, Gile worked his way up the ranks serving as Vice President in the 1960s before his promotion to President in 1969 — the position he held until retirement in 1976.

Aside from a 47 year career with Lambs, Gile has served 53 years with the Shriners, 54 with the Masons, and held memberships with numerous other community organizations.

All are welcome to join us April 22 in honoring Gile for his years of dedicated service to our local community.

Dorothea Parker, Longtime Museum Board Member, Volunteer, and Benefactor Dies at 80

Dorothea Parker, a charter member and founding Board Member of the of the Polson Museum died March 13, 2001. She was active with the Museum since its beginning and spent countless hours serving the Polson.

Mrs. Parker was one of the eleven Incorporating Board Members who established the Polson Museum on June 2, 1976. Through the late 1970s and early 1980s, Mrs. Parker worked tirelessly restoring the then decrepit mansion.

Mrs. Parker served on the Board until failing health forced her to step down in 1997. She always believed in the importance of preserving community history and saw the Museum as central to that effort.

She was truly one of the Polson's greatest supporters. Her commitment to the Museum will long be remembered.

Computer Network Installation Nearly Complete

Polson volunteer **Scott Lucas** has spearheaded the major undertaking of networking the Museum from top to bottom. From researching the needed components to installing the hardware, Scott has provided a wealth of expertise in creating the Polson's local area network.

The primary need to network the Museum stems from the location of our office space in relation to our attic collections storage area. Through the course of computerizing our collections database, we have found it increasingly necessary to input records with direct access to each artifact.

Looking to the future evolution of the Museum, we've wired data jacks at two attic locations, the office, a room across from the office, the servant's quarters, and will soon install them in the Museum Store and near the front desk. With such wiring in place, we'll have the ability to network our store inventory and add new office space.
