Museum Grieves the Loss of Two of its Greatest Supporters, Margaret Wenham & Robert A. Polson

Margaret Wenham

Longtime Museum Board Member and volunteer Margaret Wenham passed away June 30, 1997. Since the Museum formed in 1976, Margaret was continuously involved in both the long-term and day-to-day operations of the institution.

Perhaps her greatest contributions were in establishing, organizing, and maintaining the Museum's collection. Every Wednesday of the year, year in and year out, Margaret worked in our attic collection storage area cataloging the thousands of objects that have been donated over time.

Margaret also maintained strong ties to the Robert Gray Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution and served as the one in charge of maintaining the Museum's DAR room. Just this past winter, Margaret created a research library in that space by overseeing the purchase of book shelves, track lighting, and the organization of books and decorations.

Right up to the time of her death, Margaret was volunteering as actively as ever. Members will be especially interested to see in the guest bedroom the small display of purses, fans, and hat pins she completed the very week before she died.

Robert A. Polson

The Museum's greatest benefactor in recent years, Professor Robert A. Polson, of Ithaca, New York, died this last summer on July 4th. Members will recall that last December he and his wife Ruth created for the Museum an endowment fund in Professor Polson's name.

Although Polson never visited the Museum, he still took a strong interest in our cause because of its ties to his family.

Professor Polson was born in Truro, Nova Scotia in 1905 and moved at a young age to Montesano where he grew up on his father William's farm. (William was a brother of Alex and Robert who operated the Hoquiam logging company.)

After attending school and receiving his Ph.D., Polson was hired in 1931 at Cornell University, where he variously served as an extension agent, teacher, researcher, and administrator in the Rural Sociology Department until his retirement in 1971.

Beyond his extensive work at Cornell in New York, Polson completed a variety of foreign assignments in the Philippines, North Africa, and Asia. He also published a book, Rural People's Response to Change, following his retirement.

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From the Past

Olympic Stadium Opened, Thanksgiving Day 1938

With the close of a successful season for the Grays Harbor Gulls—and with newly formed plans to restore their playfield—it is fitting to shed a bit of light on the history of our prized Olympic Stadium.

The stadium dates back to December of 1929, when the City of Hoquiam purchased a 350 by 700 foot long stretch of land from the Electric land company. By 1932 and with the help of a CWA grant, the city had cleared and filled half of the purchased land.

Five years later, the Hoquiam park board met to discuss possible further improvements to the land.

With a grant through the Works Progress Administration, the City proceeded to construct the massive stadium, pouring the concrete foundation in July of 1938.

The structure, which was built with lumber from the Polson Lumber & Shingle Mills, was completed just in time for the annual Thanksgiving Day Hoquiam - Aberdeen Football Classic. True to schedule, fans sat in the newly-opened stadium and cheered Hoquiam to a 12-0 victory.

While the stadium opened to the public for that Thanksgiving Day game, it didn't publicly get its name until half-time. During the previous week, parks department officials contemplated possible name submissions from a community-wide contest. The 10 finalists were as follows: Timber Bowl, Harbor Stadium, Roosevelt Field, Lovgren Field, Hoquiam Civic Playfield, Hoquiam Olympic Stadium, Hoquiam Athletic Park, Grays Harbor Stadium, Evergreen Stadium, and The Hoquiam Stadium. As for the name, the rest is history. From nearly 800 entries, Stanley Erickson's won for him a three-year pass to all stadium events.
