Helge Erickson Selected Our 17th Pioneer of the Year

1996 Pioneer of the Year

Helge Erickson, a Hoquiam native of 85 years, will be honored as the Polson Museum's 1996 Pioneer of the Year at a celebration at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, February 23, at the Hoquiam Y.M.C.A. Mr. Erickson, born June 9, 1911, at 419 Chenault Avenue in Hoquiam, is the son of John G. and Vendla Meria Erickson, who immigrated to the United States in 1890 and 1906, respectively, from the Swedish speaking region of Finland. Still standing today, the Erickson family home is occupied by Helge's sister Svea. After the turn-of-the century, the home was often used as the first stopping place for many of the Swede-Finns who immigrated to Grays Harbor.

Helge attended Hoquiam High School and graduated in 1931. Unable to find work at the onset of the Depression, he returned to Hoquiam High to complete another year of schooling under a special program designed to ease the city's severe unemployment. During World War II—from 1942 to 1945—Helge served with the 843rd Signal Service Battalion as a radio operator. After the war he attended Coyne Electrical College in Chicago, graduating in 1948. Upon his return to the Harbor, Helge married Dorothy Pease in 1949. They adopted two children. One daughter, Camile, still resides in Hoquiam. Helge's wife Dorothy passed away in 1994.

Today Helge spends his time serving more than a few Harbor organizations. As a 47-year member of the United Methodist Church, a 49-year member of the Hoquiam Lions Club, a 50-year member of the Grays Harbor Amateur Radio Club, and a 59year member of the Olympians, Helge has given countless and selfless hours to his community. He has served in nearly every office of the Olympians, including President, and has become legendary for his Pancake Feeds at the Methodist Church. Over the years, Helge has refined his pancake recipe on countless mountain outings with the Olympians and now uses his expertise far and wide throughout our community. Today, Helge is President of the Men's Club of his church and he still frequents the Tuesday morning gathering he started at Hoquiam's Oriole Café.

Museum Receives \$20,000 From Polson Family: \$15,000 to Start Endowment

In December, the Museum received a gift of \$20,000 from Mr. & Mrs. Robert Polson of Ithaca New York. The Polsons generously donated \$5,000 to help with Museum operating costs and \$15,000 to start a long-term endowment.
