#### Fueling the Harbor: Service Station Exhibit Featured this Summer

If you haven't been in already, don't miss the Museum's special exhibit this summer on the history of service stations on Grays Harbor. *Fueling the Harbor* examines the beginnings, development, and subsequent trends of service stations from the turn-of-the-century to the present.

Fueling the Harbor features a wide assortment of artifacts and photographs from both local collectors and the Museum's collection. The exhibit will run through mid-September, 1999. Fuel and oil pumps, oil bottles and cans, signs, tools, and models highlight an examination of the development of fuel stations.

Maps, gas station giveaways, toys, and other promotional items provide examples of the various marketing tactics used by companies to encourage brand loyalty. Additionally, a rich assortment of historic photographs give visitors a nostalgic look at many of the sites where Harborites used to buy their fuel.

# Museum Recarpeting Project Slated to Go Forward This Fall—Donations Still Welcome

#### Washington Museum Association Conference-Wenatchee

This June 17-18, Director John Larson attended the annual Washington Museum Association (WMA) conference at the North Central Washington Museum in Wenatchee. The conference included sessions on project management for museums, conducting oral histories, utilizing the internet, managing financial resources, as well as a variety of other topics.

Polson Director John Larson served on a panel presentation that discussed various means of maintaining and renovating museum buildings. He specifically gave details on the Polson's collaboration with its Members, local businesses, the City of Hoquiam, and Americorps to complete roofing, residing and other recent projects.

#### Museum Director John Larson Elected to WMA Board of Trustees

At this year's annual WMA Conference, Polson Director John Larson was elected to a three year term on the Board of Trustees. The WMA is a statewide organization made up of 200 museums that provides a broad network for museum professionals in offering services, sharing ideas, and linking information from various individual museums.

#### Polson Involved in Making First Class Documentary Film

As his eighth grade final project, Spenser Bruning of Markham created a film on Grays Harbor's history from pre-American times through the 1920s. Spenser spent numerous hours at the Museum, at home, and on the road doing research, filming historic photographs, and conducting interviews of local individuals.

In addition to using a rich assortment of historic photographs and moving footage, Spenser prominently features Joe De La Cruz, James "Flagg" Locke, Ruth McClausland, R.D. Grunbaum, Helge Erickson, and John Larson in interviews.

Spenser filmed the 45-minute documentary, *Tides of Change*, in Hi-8 format before converting it to VHS.

Although the film is not available for sale, Members are invited to make an appointment to view it at the Museum or check it out to watch at home.

The Museum is also hoping to use the film for educational purposes in area schools and clubs.



#### **Weyerhaeuser Donates New Computer**

This July, Weyerhaeuser donated a brand new 333 mhz MMX computer to the Museum. The donation greatly improves the speed at which collection record information can be accessed. While the Museum is still able to use the 486 computer donated by Weyerhaeuser last year, the new machine will be able to serve the majority of the Museum's computing needs—especially in using our new scanner.

The database allows rapid access to Museum records in ways never possible with the old card catalog system. Records can be searched by accession number, category, description, donor, or any of the listed fields.

For example, you could print listings of all the artifacts located within a certain storage drawer, all that a particular donor had given, or all that had anything to do with a particular year.

#### New Rose Garden Trellis Donated by Burnett Family




